Pupil Premium Information

What is Pupil Premium?

Pupil Premium is an additional financial grant allocated to schools and is triggered by specified children. There are a range of criteria which will trigger pupil premium. The Government hope that by identifying children, schools can target those children most in need. In our school the number of children triggering Pupil Premium is low and we find that there are other children that we also wish to support. So, alongside the pupil premium grant, we use additional funding from our main budget to support all children who have some kind of additional need.

Accountability

The Government believes that Headteachers and school leaders should decide how to use the pupil premium. We are held accountable for the decisions we make through:

- Performance data which shows the performance of disadvantaged pupils compared to their peers
- The Ofsted Inspection Framework, under which inspectors focus on the attainment of pupil groups, and in particular those who attract pupil premium.

This money went partway to supporting 1:1 tuition for specified children within school.

Impact of Pupil Premium spending in financial year 2013–2014 (Academic years 2012–2013 and 2013–2014) School and National data July 2013.

In 2012–2013 (A) pupils who attracted pupil premium at Beaufront First School attained at higher levels in all measures than similar children nationally.

In addition, the difference between the attainment of PP children and Non- PP children was smaller than seen nationally.

Impact of Pupil Premium spending in financial year 2014-2015 (Academic years 2013–2014 and still to come 2014– 2015) School and National data July 2014.

In 2013–2014(A) pupils who attracted pupil premium at Beaufront First School attained at least within national expectations in all measures. In some measures attainment was well above national expectations.
